

WHAT IS BLACK HISTORY MONTH?

Black joy, laughter, healing and so much more.

With roots dating back to the summer of 1915, Black History Month is an annual month-long celebration of Black identity. Carter G. Woodson, considered by many to be the "Father of Black History," founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History (ASNLH) in hopes to raise awareness of the many contributions of African Americans in the world. The group created and announced Negro History Week in 1925 which would be first celebrated the following year. You can learn more about Woodson's work and legacy here. After decades of the celebration receiving more widespread recognition and becoming a part of life for many African Americans, the tradition was expanded to a month in 1976. With roots dating back just over a decade, the Days-Massolo Center is the result of student-led efforts in the fall of 2008 led by the Social Justice Initiative (SJI). The group pushed for Hamilton to create a cultural education center on campus, a dream that would become reality after the group organized, spread a petition across campus and amplified the request through a series of formal presentations.

Opened on Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day in 2011, the DMC is named after trustees Drew S. Days III '63 and Arthur J. Massolo '64. Our mission is to promote community inclusion, facilitate intercultural dialogue, build collaborations and establish partnerships on campus to create a Hamilton where every student feels welcome.

"We could say that our story started when some students got angry..." These are the opening words to a group's story, one reflected today through the mission of the Days-Massolo Center. The fifth page reads "Social Justice Initiative Charter. May 15, 2007... The Social Justice Initiative is a coalition of students dedicated to creating positive change in the experience, treatment, and interaction of marginalized groups and to promote interaction and awareness among all students at Hamilton College." Student-formed and student-led, this coalition was formed by various cultural organizations, including those now known as the Black Latinx Student Union, La Vanguardia, the Womxn's Center and the Gender & Sexuality Union. It's mission was to "unite the existing multicultural groups on campus, to advocate curricular change that better reflects the diversity of the world, to promote faculty administrative sensitivity toward diverse and marginalized students, to make the social scene at Hamilton more reflective of the diverse population by raising awareness and activism among students." One of the group's requests was the formation of a "Multicultural Center" on campus. It's time we share their story, our story.


SJI CELEBRATION LOGO CONTEST
